Grade 8 Reading Reading Activities

Activity 1: For your first choice book. Answer each question in a fully developed paragraph (total of 5 paragraphs). Use evidence as relevant/appropriate.

- 1) Which part of the story caused the most intense feelings in you? Why?
- **2)** Which character can you connect with the most in your book and why? How did the author reveal this person's character traits?
- **3)** Analyze how a different setting would affect the characters or plot of this story.
- **4)** How does the conflict affect the characters, their actions, and their motivations?
- **5)** What has the main character learned at the end of the novel, based on his or her experiences? How has he or she changed from the beginning to the end?

Activity 2: Book #2. Dialogue. Choose a scene in your book in which the dialogue was extremely important. Illustrate that scene on a sheet of paper. You may also do this digitally, through Google Draw, or a collage.

Activity 3: Book #2. Reader's choice foldable. Select 5 important events, people, themes, moods, etc (a combination is fine). Create a foldable about your 5 choices and why you included those particular pieces. This can be done digitally, using Google Slides.
