KIRTLAND LOCAL SCHOOLS EXCEEDS STATE STANDARDS
ON 2022-23 STATE REPORT CARD

On September 14, the Ohio Department of Education released the 2022-23 School Report Cards for the more than 600 districts in the state. The Kirtland Local School District has been awarded an exceptional five-star rating, the highest attainable recognition. Furthermore, the district's overall Performance Index has reached unprecedented heights, marking it as the highest in at least the past eight years and is ranked in the top 9% of the state.

"This remarkable accomplishment has placed our district within the top 9% of all school districts in the state, reflecting the dedication and hard work of our students, staff, and community," said Superintendent Chad VanArnhem. "Our students have demonstrated remarkable progress, achieving at levels surpassing those prior to the pandemic. This is truly a momentous achievement, and I couldn't be prouder of our collective efforts."

The Ohio School Report Cards include performance information provided by schools and districts including academic, financial, and opportunity to learn data. Some of this data is then combined into six components (listed to the right) that receive star ratings to indicate the level of performance for the school and district.

"I want to extend my deepest appreciation to all our students, staff, families, and community members for their role in making this success possible," said VanArnhem. "Your unwavering support and commitment to our school district have played a pivotal role in this outstanding

achievement."

The Early Literacy Component is a measure of reading improvement and proficiency for students in kindergarten through third grade. Four stars means the district exceeds state standards in academic achievement.

KIRTLAND LOCAL SCHOOLS ANNOUNCES NEW MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPALS

At the Special Board of Education meeting on July 26, 2023, Mr. Bob Race was approved to become Kirtland Middle School (KMS) principal for the next three school years and Mr. Victor Puskas was approved to be the next principal at Kirtland High School.

KIRTLAND HIGH SCHOOL AMONG TOP HIGH SCHOOLS IN OHIO

Kirtland High School (KHS) is once again among the top public high schools in Ohio according to the U.S. News & World Report's Best High Schools ranking released on August 29, 2023.



KHS ranks No. 1 among high schools in Lake County, No. 20 among 146 high schools in the Cleveland area, and No. 76 among 741 high schools in the State of Ohio, placing it in the top 11% of public high schools statewide. Nationally, KHS ranks 2,109 among the

approximately 18,000 public high schools who were ranked across the nation of the approximately 25,000 public high schools.

The ranking is based on five criteria with the weight of each criteria given a certain percentage and all five criteria totaling 100 percent. These criteria include

- Proficiency on state-required tests (20 percent)
- Performance on state-required tests (20 percent)
- Performance of underserved students, such as minorities and those from low-income households (20 percent)
- How well students are prepared for college (30
- Graduation rate (10 percent).

KIRTLAND COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER TO UNVEIL **NEW ARTIFICIAL TURF STADIUM**

Kirtland Local Schools and the Kirtland community officially celebrated the opening of their new artificial turf stadium on August 26 with a ribbon cutting ceremony before the first home football game of the season against Lutheran West.

"There was a lot of hard work that went into the stadium renovation from a lot of different people, so to see our students on the field is a dream come true," said Superintendent Chad VanArnhem.

The Kirtland High School (KHS) soccer teams were the first team to play an official game at the new Wilson Stadium on August 22 while the Kirtland Hornet Marching Band and the football team also got practice time on the field earlier in the day.

A permanent improvement levy helped fund the stadium project as well as the KHS science lab renovation. The Kirtland Athletic Boosters donated \$40,000 toward

the turf, ACO donated \$22,000 toward drainage and the long jump and the Kirtland Kiwanis Club donated \$5,000 plus labor work to help renovate the home team's press box.

John Wilson, Jr., owner of AQUA DOC Lake & Pond Management and a 1980 graduate of Kirtland High School purchased the naming rights to the stadium for \$200,000 last fall.

Kirtland Local Schools would like to thank everyone who helped complete this project including: Marous Brothers Construction, Then Design Architects, local civil engineer John Urbanick, Kirtland grounds crew members John Lipps and Dave Sluga, the Kirtland Kiwanis and Mike Kost from BK Flectric.

Before the revitalization of Wilson Stadium, the Kirtland Local Schools and the surrounding community faced severe limitations in utilizing the stadium. The field's dimensions rendered it unsuitable for soccer. Moreover, the location of visiting stands and light poles inside of the track further restricted its versatility. To compound matters, the field often deteriorated into a muddy

mess after just a few games played in wet conditions. As a result, it was primarily reserved for high school football, and even then, its usability was compromised. Home playoff football games even had to be played at other stadiums because of the field conditions. The marching band had to tolerate sloppy conditions during the Hornets' deep postseason runs. These issues, however, are now a thing of the past!

The field has undergone significant improvements that include state of the art turf that is wide enough for a soccer field. Wilson Stadium has proudly hosted numerous soccer games, featuring both boys' and girls' teams spanning grades 7 through 12. Also, our soccer teams now get to play games under the lights which they were not able to do in the past. Additionally, all football teams in grades 7 through 12 have had the privilege of utilizing the field. Excitement abounds as youth football teams and cheerleaders too have had the opportunity to play in the stadium.

Beyond athletics, the marching band now enjoys the luxury of marching on the turf rather than navigating dirt patches that inevitably turn into mud. The middle school has taken advantage of the upgraded facilities by sending students out to participate in various activities, including



recreational time before and after lunch. The wellness classes now use the field and track for physical activities that were previously limited to the gymnasium. On extended block days, some teachers also use the field to give their students short physical breaks, which research shows is necessary and boosts student

productivity. Additionally, the middle school girls' and boys' soccer teams, cheerleaders, and football players have all been given the opportunity to participate in at least one game on the upper field. Previously, the upper field was only usable by the middle school football team during the first few weeks of the season before the turf was installed. "All of us at the middle school are so grateful for such a beautiful facility and an extension of our learning space," said Principal Bob Race, Kirtland Middle School.

Kirtland Elementary, in particular, utilized the track during the entire week of September 11th for their annual walkathon. This culminated in a special walkathon night held just before the Friday night football game on September 15th, where hundreds of students and family members came together to participate. Many of the elementary students have also enjoyed playing on the youth field during the Friday night football games which is located behind the east end zone.

Furthermore, the new track has become a hub of community activity, regularly frequented by residents. The addition of "night lights" has extended its usability into the evening hours, providing lighting for an evening walk or jog. The field has also been rented out to another school to generate revenue for the district.





KIRTLAND HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE STUDENTS ENJOY NEW LAB SPACE

The new, renovated science room at Kirtland High School opened in January 2023. The renovation focused on opening up two small rooms to create one larger, improved and functional learning area for the students. The classroom also needed new electrical, plumbing, floors, ceiling tiles, countertops, and a fresh coat of paint.

The room now allows the students to bounce back-andforth seamlessly from a laboratory

setting to a classroom space while also being able to take advantage of the new upgraded technology such as the monitors located at every lab station that displays students' real-time work or teaching materials. "This is a great addition to our high school because it allows the students to experience a better lab experience that will prepare them for college-level labs and for future career opportunities," said science teacher Alexandra Ardo.

KIRTLAND MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENT PLACES FIRST IN NATIONAL POSTER COMPETITION


Kirtland Middle School Student Cole Nowacki won first place in the 2023 National Data Visualization Poster & Project Statistics Competition in the fourth-sixth grade division. The poster and project competitions are directed by the ASA/National Council of Teachers of Mathematics Joint Committee on Curriculum in Statistics and Probability.

Cole titled his project "The Gaming Generation" and his research topic was to describe gaming usage, patterns and character preferences of middle school students.

Each student was challenged to create posters that displayed two or more related graphics that summarized a set of data, look at the data from different points of view, and answer specific questions about the data.

Cole selected a topic of interest to him, identified his research questions, developed his survey questions, created a Google form to collect data, administered the survey to fellow sixth and seventh graders and then created visualizations of the resulting data to put on his poster.

Cole looked at data sets including style of game play, gaming systems, average hours of gameplay, favorite



characters and how many students own gaming systems.

He submitted his poster in March and was notified in April that he won first place in Ohio in the 4-6 grade division. For placing first at national level in his age division Cole will receive a certificate, a monetary award and a Texas Instruments calculator.

KIRTLAND LOCAL SCHOOLS RECEIVES SUPPLY OF EPIPENS AND TRAINING COURSE FROM LOCAL NON-PROFIT

The Allison Rose Foundation is supplying the Kirtland Local Schools with an inventory of epinephrine injectors (EpiPens) at no cost to the District. These epinephrine injectors are important precautionary devices that can be used if someone has a severe allergic reaction called anaphylaxis.

In addition to supply of the epinephrine injectors, the Kirtland Board of Education entered into a year-long partnership with the foundation during which time they will help provide training to staff and students including supplying information about food allergies, anaphylactic reactions and cross contamination. "We thought it would be a great idea to educate all of our staff on the dangers of allergies and also how to use an EpiPen," said Superintendent Chad VanArnhem.

The Allison Rose Foundation is a non-profit located in Independence with a goal of decreasing and eliminating deaths caused by food allergies in children and young adults. They focus on education, awareness, advocacy, and research. "The Allison Rose Foundation provides a comprehensive program/process for any entity that wants stock epinephrine prescribed to them," said Allison Rose Foundation Executive Director Rebecca Suhy. "Obtaining this life-saving medication, while not difficult, can be time consuming. Therefore, we streamline this process and make it simple."

Over 75 school districts, a majority of which are located in Northeast Ohio, have been trained by the foundation.

KIRTLAND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL RECOGNIZES AND HONORS FIRST RESPONDERS WITH ANNUAL DRIVE-THROUGH PARADE

On Monday September 11, 2023, in honor of Patriot Day, the staff and students at Kirtland Elementary School (KES) honored all of the community's first responders in an outdoor parade. Officers in their vehicles drove through the school parking lot as students lined the driveways wearing red, white and blue, cheering, clapping, and waving American flags to show appreciation for all they do.

"September 11, 2001, was one of the darkest days in our country's history," said Superintendent Chad VanArnhem. "Not to be lost in the tragedy was the heroism and selfless acts of so many from the passengers on Flight 93 to the first responders in Washington D.C. and New York City. While remembering the events of 9/11, I would like to publicly thank all the emergency forces that serve the Kirtland Local Schools for their tireless dedication to keeping us safe. September11th is a day we will not forget and also provides a day of reflection and thankfulness for those that risk their lives daily to protect ours."

MESSAGE TO THE COMMUNITY

Hello Kirtland Community,

I am so thankful for the support of all of our stakeholders which ensured we had a very successful start to the 2023-2024 school year.

As we returned to school, safety continued to be a major focus for the district. Last school year, the Kirtland Local School District was awarded over \$125,000 in grant money from the state for safety enhancements. Over the past few years, the district has enhanced numerous safety features around the campus and will continue looking for ways to improve. This summer, bullet resistant film was added to all the first floor exterior windows. Propped door alarms were installed on the exterior doors. A full scale safety drill was also conducted this fall with the help of our local first responders. The schools will continue to work closely with the Kirtland Police and Fire Department with safety planning, discussions and quarterly meetings. The district has further trained the threat assessment team that consists of administrators and counselors. We have a full time Student Resource Officer on campus as another layer of protection.

For the 2023-2024 school year, the district will be looking to enhance its writing by integrating the Writing Revolution program across all subject areas. Grades 6-12 will also be going through a social studies curriculum audit this school year. Our current materials will be analyzed to see how they can be improved and teachers will be receiving ongoing professional development on best social studies instructional practices. All teachers will be receiving high-quality and ongoing professional development throughout the school year to review best instructional and assessment practices.

I am so proud of the support we have received from our community as we have renovated our high school biology lab and our stadium. Numerous people, organizations, and community groups stepped up to support our school district to provide a great learning space and an updated place for extracurricular activities.


WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?

General Property Taxes -73% State Aid - 15% Federal - 5% Other Revenues -7%




WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

Personnel Services - 82% Purchased Services - 12% Supplies and Materials - 2% Capital Outlay - 2% Other Objects - 2%








Mother Nature challenged Kirltand's sports throughout the spring but the Hornets persevered, as always.
