SUPERINTENDENT HIGHLIGHTS KIRTLAND LOCAL SCHOOLS' ACHIEVEMENTS AND OUTLINES STRATEGIC VISION IN ANNUAL STATE OF THE SCHOOLS ADDRESS

In his annual State of the Schools address, Superintendent Chad VanArnhem celebrated the remarkable achievements of Kirtland Local Schools' students, staff, and community while outlining the district's strategic vision for the future. The comprehensive presentation showcased the district's commitment to personalized learning, safe and secure environments, well-managed finances, and engaged community partnerships.

Highlighting the district's academic excellence, VanArnhem proudly announced that 21 Kirtland High School students were named AP Scholars in recognition of their exceptional achievement on college-level AP exams, with 11 students earning the prestigious AP Scholar with Distinction honor. Additionally, 44 students graduated with an Honors Diploma, 17 students achieved an ACT score of 28 or higher, and one student was recognized for earning a perfect ACT score.

"Our students' outstanding academic performance and dedication to their studies are a testament to the exceptional education provided by our talented staff," said VanArnhem. "We are committed to fostering an environment that promotes intellectual curiosity, develops college and career pathways, and leverages the use of technology to support personalized learning."

VanArnhem also emphasized the district's unwavering commitment to providing a safe and secure environment for students and staff. Initiatives such as partnering with local safety officials, promoting wellness, implementing trauma-

informed practices, and conducting regular safety drills ensure a supportive and nurturing learning environment.

Addressing the district's financial management, VanArnhem highlighted the successful passage of the March 19 renewal levy, which generates \$1,552,615 annually without resulting in tax increases. He also outlined the district's efforts to control costs, explore alternative revenue options, and educate the community on school finances.

Community engagement remained a crucial aspect of VanArnhem's address, as he emphasized the district's partnerships with local organizations, businesses, and alumni. He also commended the students' commitment to community service, with the Class of 2024 contributing over 5,250 hours of service.

"The success of our district is a collective effort, and we are grateful for the unwavering support of our community partners," VanArnhem said. "Together, we will continue to provide personalized education for all students and empower them to become engaged and responsible citizens."

The State of the Schools address concluded with VanArnhem expressing his gratitude to the district's teachers, staff, parents, and community members for their ongoing dedication and support, ensuring that Kirtland Local Schools remains a beacon of excellence in education.

KIRTLAND LOCAL SCHOOLS RECOGNIZED BY OHIO DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION & WORKFORCE FOR 2022-2023 REPORT CARD

Kirtland Local Schools has achieved the prestigious Overall Five-Star Award for the district's results on the 2022-2023 traditional report card. This award recognizes districts that exceed state standards by earning an overall five stars on the traditional report card for their performance across the five rated components: Achievement Component, Progress Component, Gap Closing Component, Early Literacy Component, and Graduation Component.

The overall Five-Star Building Award was given to Kirtland Elementary School and Kirtland High School. This is awarded to buildings that exceeded state standards by earning an overall five stars on the Traditional Report Card for their performance across these components: Achievement Component, Progress Component, Gap Closing Component, Early Literacy Component, Graduation Component, College, Career, Workforce and



Military Readiness Component. Kirtland Middle School received the Momentum Award. The Momentum Award is for districts and buildings that have demonstrated outstanding improvement in achievement while also continuing to show growth. They improved their performance index by three or more points from 2021-2022 report card to the 2022-2023 report card and received a value-added progress rating of four or more stars.

"This recognition is a testament to the collective effort of our entire staff, who contribute to the supportive and nurturing environment that enables our students to thrive academically and personally," said Superintendent Chad VanArnhem, Kirtland Local Schools. "The combined commitment of excellence from our students, staff, and community is truly commendable."

THIRD GRADERS BRING HISTORY TO LIFE WITH WAX MUSEUM PROJECT

Kirtland Elementary third-grade students brought history to life through an engaging living biography project on famous Americans for their Wax Museum. With support from parents and teachers, the young scholars embarked on extensive research, taking detailed notes from biographies and utilizing digital tools to create visual presentations.

On May 24, students confidently shared findings through Google Slide presentations and note cards. They vividly described the lives and impact of iconic figures from

American History books. The presentations showcased significant growth in the students' writing, speaking and listening skills as they recalled details and spoke clearly about their research subjects. The interdisciplinary project integrated language arts skills with social studies content.

After gaining a deeper understanding of important Americans and the valuable capability to analyze information from multiple sources these students are ready to take on fourth grade.

FOURTH GRADERS PRESENT HANDS-ON SCIENCE EXPERIMENTS

Every spring, Kirtland Elementary School fourth graders take the lead on choosing and conducting their own science experiments as part of an end-of-year independent project in the annual Fourth Grade Science Fair. The annual experiment presentations allow students to explore topics beyond the standard curriculum as each student chooses their own area of study. They then develop their own research question, gather materials, carry out the experiment at home, and analyze the results. On presentation days, the young scientists share their process and findings with their homeroom classmates through live demonstrations and explanations of why their results occur.

"This allows the students to not only independently learn, but to also practice public speaking," said Principal Katy Nagaj.



KIRTLAND HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS RECOGNIZED FOR VOLUNTEER HOURS

Over 2,550 high school students throughout the state of Ohio are being honored for their service through ServeOhio. Kirtland High School is one of the 50 schools that has students being honored for their service 2023-2024 school year.

In collaboration with InnerView Technologies, ServeOhio, the state's commission dedicated to promoting service and volunteerism, takes great pride in honoring exceptional Ohio high school students who have made significant contributions to their communities and the state through their commitment to volunteer work and community service.

The ServeOhio Community Impact Award honors high school students (grades 9 – 12) at any public or private school in Ohio who serve 20 hours in 4 or more service activities in the last year. Recipients will receive a certificate and letter of appreciation.

KIRTLAND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL SPRING CELEBRATION BREWS UP LEARNING, LAUGHTER, AND A ‘LATTE FUN

Kirtland Elementary School’s (KES) Celebration of Learning took place on May 23 and featured a “StarBOOKS” theme which turned KES into a coffee shop for the evening.

This event, which saw more than 400 families in attendance, showcased students’ academic progress and their learning journey this year, allowing them to personally guide their loved ones through their portfolios and classwork. What started off as an idea for a literacy night event became an unforgettable celebration that perfectly wrapped up the 2023-2024 school year for the KES community.

“It was our goal to provide an opportunity for all KES families to celebrate the learning that has taken place throughout this school year, both in classrooms and in the related arts areas, and offer a variety of engaging activities for everyone to participate in and enjoy,” said KES Principal Katy Nagaj. “I’m proud to say that we accomplished both!”

“An occasion like this fosters bonds between our school staff and our students and their families,” said KES K-5 Literacy Interventionist Julie Bonacci. “As educators, we strive to nurture not only our students’ academic achievements but also their overall development as individuals. This is particularly true in an elementary setting, where we collaborate closely with parents and guardians year-round. Establishing strong relationships is vital for fostering successful partnerships.”

The building was transformed into a coffee shop through the generosity of parent donations that allowed the organizing team to bring the event to life through white lights, streamers, balloons, and green aprons for the “baristas.”

The festivities kicked off with “This is How We Brew It,” where students from grades K-5 had the opportunity to walk their families through classroom visits and showcase their knowledge from the school year.

KES families got to explore outside the classrooms as well. First up was the “Sip & Stroll,” a KES Art show that was a visual feast for the senses, featuring the students’ own artwork. A special feature included the “Glow Gallery.” Led by KES art teacher Valerie Jacobucci, the room featured neon artwork that glowed beneath black lights. Families also enjoyed the “I Like to Read A ‘Latte” section, where free books were up for grabs, encouraging a love for reading in the young students.

Adding to the excitement, the Kirtland PTA arranged for a one-night Scholastic Book Fair, providing a perfect opportunity for parents and students to jumpstart their summer reading adventures.

A “Coffee Corner” was set up in the atrium where KES STEAM Teacher Bob Lasecki brought live announcements to life while also quizzing the families on their knowledge and hosting fun games like “finish the lyrics.” Participating families had the chance to win prizes donated by four local community businesses. Thank you to Tavern Six, Holden Arboretum, Sweeter than Honeycomb Bakery, and Kirtland Mayor Kevin Potter’s office for supporting KES. The “Perfect Blend Cafe” was an actual refreshment area featuring sweet treats for all ages.

Students could indulge in creamy chocolate milk and donuts, while the adults could enjoy cool, refreshing sips of iced coffee! Families also had the opportunity to take home a piece of the “StarBOOKS” magic by purchasing merchandise created for the event as well as regular Kirtland branded items.

“Myself and other parents were absolutely blown away at how incredible it was,” said KES parent Kelly Addis. “All the work that went into it did not go unnoticed and is so greatly appreciated...my kids loved sharing all their hard work. The Starbucks theme was so cute and the set up in the gym felt like a fun family night out!”

Two Kirtland Local Schools’ students have brought home honors in the prestigious Trig-Star state contest, which challenges the mathematical prowess of high

school students across Ohio. Sam Gordon secured an impressive second-place finish, earning a well-deserved \$125 award, while Daniel Bak’s exceptional performance landed him in third place, taking home \$75.

JUNIOR’S EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT BRINGS GAGA BALL FUN TO ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

Kirtland Elementary School students are enjoying the fast-paced inclusive fun of Gaga Ball on their playground thanks to Kirtland High School junior Walter Knoop’s recent Eagle Scout project as a member of Scout Troop 286. Gaga Ball is a fast-paced game of dodge-ball contained in a 20’ octagon - the trick being you slap the ball rather than throw it, and you are only “out” if the ball hits you below the knee. All players have a chance at winning these quick games encouraging many exciting rounds during a recess period.

Walter’s idea for the Gaga Ball pit comes from years of playing this fun game at summer camp. Conceiving and leading a multi-generational community project, Walter organized a team of 21 adults and students to build the octagon on the elementary playground. These volunteers



combined to provide 74 hours of service on March 24. All this was made possible thanks to the financial support of the Kirtland Kiwanis and Barber Williams American Legion Post 609, as well as an in-kind donation of lumber from the Chardon Home Depot.

Walter says that he found the most challenging part of the project was directing people during the building phase, as the project is deceptively difficult to assemble with the heavy wood sections. But as everyone worked together they found their pace and tempo and it was a big success.

KIRTLAND MIDDLE SCHOOL TOOK A BREAK FROM SCREENS

The school hoped the screen-free week raised awareness about the risks of excessive screen time, which can contribute to issues like obesity, sleep problems, attention issues, and social difficulties. Research shows reducing screen time can have significant benefits for children’s health and academic performance.



Students and families were challenged to find alternative screen-free activities as well as sign a Screen Free Pledge Card. Each family decided what “screen-free” meant for them.

The school raised funds during the week for new fitness equipment and STEM supplies through student/family pledges to remain screen-free.

Kirtland’s spring sports season ended with the girls’ 4x800-meter relay team running the second-fastest time in school history at the 2024 OHSA Division II State Track & Field Championships on Friday, May 31. The Hornets were inspired by a pre-race dinner with former Kirtland standout Jenna Sayle, who competed collegiately at Miami University.

“These girls have been so focused all season long and really hit their stride starting with conference championships,” said Kirtland coach J.P. Moran. “They are such gamers and always rose to the occasion to reach their goal of competing at the state meet. It was an amazing season and experience for all. This experience will be so beneficial moving forward as all return in cross country and track next school year.”

Izzie Copeland, Megan Urbanick, Ainsley Borthwick, and Sylvia Vosicky teamed up to finish that race in 9:47.83, good for 14th place overall.

“The experience was priceless,” Moran said. “They said they couldn’t even feel their legs, and it was like a dream coming down to the start.”

The Hornets kicked off their postseason run with 10 titles at the Chagrin Valley Conference including seven individual and three relay championships. Both Will Sayle and Borthwick claimed two individual titles and Copeland, Lauren Palagyi, and Chloe Hansen won one.

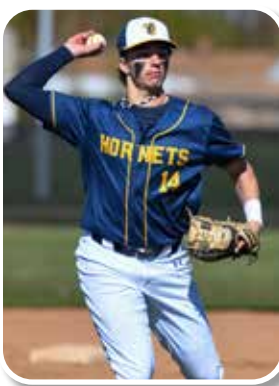
Sayle won the long jump and 400-meter dash with a jump of 19 feet, 9 inches and a time of 52.72 in his sprint.

Borthwick won both the 1600 and 3200 in 5:25.02 and 11:44.15, respectively. Hansen won the discus with a best toss of 101-4, and Copeland claimed the title in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:26.18. Palagyi won her first CVC title in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 17.36.

Palagyi teamed up with Olivia Dolovacky, Lexi Vosicky, and Macie Susevich to win the 4x200 in 1:55. Lexi Vosicky, Sylvia Vosicky, Copeland, and Urbanick won the 4x400 in 4:17.88. The 4x800 team also claimed a conference title.

Borthwick (1600), Syliva Vosicky (400), Copeland (800), Hansen (discus), Sayle (400), Joey Ciavarelli (3200), Will Beers (long jump), and Charlie Vignero (discus) all advanced to compete in the regional competition this spring.

Kirtland’s baseball team earned a share of the CVC Valley Division title after finishing the year with a 18-8 record overall and a 10-2 mark in conference play.



Gino Blasini, Trip Thaler, and Tyler Turk earned first-team All-CVC honors while Max Paul, Xavier Lasecki, Will Bates, and Carter Luzar were named to the second team. Macguire Boyd and Luci Cantini were honorable mention selections.

Thaler and Turk also earned second-team All-Ohio honors and Blasini was an honorable mention All-Ohioan.

Kirtland’s softball team struggled to a 1-17 record this spring in head coach Jerry Jeffrey’s first season guiding the Hornets.

Senior Gianna DiFranco had a big year for the Hornets, and she was recognized as a first-team All-CVC performer. Addison Fleming earned second-team All-CVC honors and Kennedy Body and Maggie Kothera were honorable mention selections.

Kirtland’s boys’ tennis team finished second at the CVC Lake Division tournament.

Nik Barisic and Daniel Bak teamed up to earn second-team All-CVC honors at first doubles, Nora Withrow and Stephanie Drazetic earned second-team honors at second doubles, and Sam Gordon was a second-team honoree in third singles.
