# Hello Kirtland Community,

Our campus has such a positive energy with our students being back for in-person learning since the

beginning of the school year. While the ongoing pandemic has presented some challenges, I am so proud of our students, staff and families for persevering to ensure learning is taking place in a very supportive atmosphere. A lot of great instruction and learning is taking place daily in our classrooms.

Our students have also been active and thriving in their extracurricular activities and community service.

I want to give some updates on the larger Permanent Improvement projects that are planned for the campus. The district has hired ThenDesign Architecture (TDA) through a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) process that took place in July. The Board of Education is currently in the process of putting out an RFQ for a Construction Manager at Risk.

A series of meetings have taken place at Kirtland High School with staff to plan for the remodeling of a science lab. Two small classrooms that are not functional will be combined to create a flexible learning and lab area in one large room. Science teacher Alex Ardo has been involved with the design and has shown great excitement for what this remodeled classroom will allow her students to do.

The architects have presented different options for remodeling the stadium. Feedback was provided from a community group consisting of a variety of stakeholders. After receiving the input from the community group, the initial plans are to have the stadium in the same footprint that it currently sits. If two more lanes were added to the track, it would need to be slightly angled and would add an additional cost of over \$800,000 to the project. So, the decision was made to keep the track six lanes and resurface it. The visiting stands will be removed in the spring 2022 which will allow the field to be wide enough



for soccer, too. In the spring 2022, the plan is to add field turf, new LED lights and a new scoreboard to have in place for the 2022 fall season. Temporary stands will be used and placed on the track for the visiting side. The second phase of the stadium remodel will take place in the spring 2023. This will include moving the buses to a different location to create much more needed space. The current home side is very limited for development and will become the visiting side. The old visiting side will then become the home side which will allow for larger stands to accommodate more fans and the band, a press box, concessions, restrooms and a plaza space for the community. The district will also be soliciting in kind donations and generating revenue through advertising and naming rights. #### "BUILD THE BRIDGE" PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTED AT FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME CEREMONY

Students on the Kirtland High School varsity football team have continued their efforts in becoming more social-emotional players and people through the "Build the Bridge" program over the summer. The significance of the program between not just Kirtland and Shaker Heights City School District, but all participating teams in Ohio, led to a recognition at the Football Hall of Fame.

Build the Bridge was established by two coaches in Cleveland Heights and one in Beachwood to foster studentathletes' success through social-emotional, educational and athletic advancement. Coaches, players, parents, school administrations and the community play an important role in ensuring the players develop personal connections with other players. Key areas of focus are awareness of social justice and race relations.

Kirtland Varsity Football Coach Tiger LaVerde said, "The hopes of all the football coaches involved in this program

is that we educate all of our players to appreciate others from different backgrounds and cultures. All the coaches involved care about our country and want to make it a better place for our children."

Since the partnership between Kirtland and Shaker formed in September of last year, the teams have continued to work on creating connections. Over the summer, LaVerde said student-athletes participated in a softball game with Shaker Heights, held combined team workouts and ate lunch together.

"Partnering with Shaker Heights through the Build the Bridge program is an excellent opportunity to show how athletics can provide a platform to help our student-athletes better understand and appreciate one another," said Athletic Director Matt Paul, Kirtland Local Schools.

This program caught the attention of the National Football League, as it was highlighted at a recent NFL ceremony held at the Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. LaVerde said one of the Build the Bridge founders, Cleveland Heights Coach Kahari Hicks, invited him to attend the ceremony with him.

"It was a once in a lifetime experience to be in a room with more than 100 Hall of Fame players," said LaVerde. The Hall of Fame thanked Kahari for starting the initiative and LaVerde

witnessed the occasion while sitting among every living hall of fame member.

As the program continues to develop between the Kirtland and Shaker Heights football teams, the goal remains clear to LaVerde. "I want our players to have a heart for others and care about people."

# **SPORTS SHORTS**

Kirtland's fall sports teams have enjoyed unprecedented success this season as all four of Kirtland's team sports squads entered October ranked by their respective state polls.

The Hornets were a unanimous No. 1 choice in the Division V AP state football poll. Kirtland received all 23 first-place votes after entering the week 5-0 with a back-to-back-to-back state titles and a 46-game winning streak. The Hornets also sit atop the weekly OHSAA computer point rankings, which determine the playoff seedings.

Mason Rus is nearing the 1,000-yard mark for the season as he has carried the ball 118 times for 925 vards and a team-best 13 touchdowns. Tommy Gogolin has added 478 yards on the ground with seven touchdowns and Ramon Lescano has rushed for 383 vards and three scores. Lescano also has thrown for 437 yards and seven scores. His favorite target is Gage Sullivan, who has hauled in 20 passes for 372 yards and eight scores.

Kirtland's girls' soccer team, the defending Division III state champion, is ranked third in Division III. The Hornets are 7-2-3 on the year. Erika Zschuppe, the reigning Division III Player of the Year, recorded the 150th goal of her career on Sept. 26 and leads the Hornets with 28 goals this season. She also is second on the team with eight assists. Giuliana Vladic is the team leader with nine assists.

Expectations are high for the Kirtland boys' soccer team, which is off to a 10-1-1 start. The Hornets' success hasn't gone unnoticed as they currently are ranked No. 5 in Division III. Marco Valentic leads the Hornets with 28 goals and Jason de Zwaan is close behind with 18. Six of Kirtland's 10 wins have been shutouts.

Kirtland's golf team closed out the season at the sectional tournament on Sept. 27. Prior to

that, Victor Alfieri shot a 75 at the league's postseason tournament to claim medalist honors. He also finished the season as the Chagrin Valley Conference Valley Division's MVP with a total of 244 points.

The Kirtland Hornets soccer team started off the 2021 season by winning in more ways than one. Following the girls' soccer game on August 13, both the boys' and girls' soccer teams partnered with their

opponents from Eastlake North to host a soccer clinic as part of the Empower Sports program.

Empower Sports is a nonprofit organization that provides sports and exercise programs for children and adults with physical and cognitive disabilities. Its mission is to enrich the lives of athletes of diverse challenges through exercise and sports while promoting kindness, character and tolerance.

Student athletes participated in the program as part of the Ohio High School Athletic Association's Friday Night Futbol Initiative. There were six different stations in the clinic

available for Empower Sports participants to sharpen their skills. A Kirtland or North student athlete was paired with a participant while other students acted as coaches at each of the stations.

Kirtland Senior Macy McIntosh said in an Ohio Varsity article that it was a new opportunity for Kirtland athletes as they had run a children's camp before, but not for those with disabilities. "It was super nice to have our teams come together to give back to those kids and it's definitely something I hope other people can see and want to take part in with the program they have at Empower. It's nice to know the love of the sport can bring us all together," said McIntosh. The Kirtland girls' soccer Coach Ed Bradac said having the student athletes work with the Empower Sports participants fell in line with one of the team's core values, which states that the truly extraordinary do something every day.

"It was great to see our women's team interact with Empower athletes and the teams from North, it was fun to watch," said Bradac.

#### KIRTLAND HIGH CLASS OF 1971 TOURS SCHOOL CAMPUS AFTER 50 YEARS

The Kirtland High School class of 1971 took a walk down memory lane when they revisited the Kirtland campus 50 years after graduating. The class had their 50th high school reunion during the weekend of August 28, and when alumna Nora Nemec reached out to Kirtland Local Schools' Superintendent Chad VanArnhem about taking a tour of the buildings, he was more than accommodating.



A group of 20 alumni took an hour and a half tour of the now connected elementary, middle, and high schools. Nemec said the connected buildings were one of the changes she noticed. "Kirtland High School used to have two floors and one hall with a corridor to the gym," said Nemec. Her class was the first sixth-grade class in the new middle school, which opened in the late 1960s, and students had to walk outside to get to the building. "The campus has changed tremendously, it doesn't even resemble what it was 50 years ago," said Nemec.

Among the stops on the tour was the high school library, which now features a 3D printing lab. Nemec said she and her classmates were surprised at the amount of technology compared to their library, which was a renovated classroom primarily filled with books. "Everything is so modern. It was an eye-opener for the class. They were impressed."

As she and her classmates toured the campus, every room brought a new memory and stories were told throughout the tour. The experience culminated with the class eating lunch together in the cafeteria. "It was a blast," Nemec said, noting she promised VanArnhem there would be no food fights.

The 20 people on the tour had all been classmates at Kirtland Local Schools since kindergarten. Nemec said she received emails from some of the attendees thanking her for coordinating and stating their amazement at the stories people remembered and shared.









# KIRTLAND PTA AWARDED NATIONAL PTA SCHOOL OF EXCELLENCE DESIGNATION

The Kirtland PTA was awarded the National PTA School of Excellence designation for 2020-2022 for their accomplishments in building a strong, effective family-school partnership that is enriching the educational experience and overall well-being for all students.

"We worked towards this goal for two years through Covid-19 and unprecedented times," said former President Alison Wuliger. "Our School of Excellence goal was to promote healthy lifestyles at home and school. When Covid-19 hit, focusing on the physical and emotional well-being of our school community became even more

important. I am so proud of the work the PTA has done and thrilled our application was accepted."

Only five PTA's in the State of Ohio received this recognition and Kirtland is the only PTA in Lake County.

The PTA created a speaker series with presentations from a psychologist who talked about "Managing Stress and Anxiety through a Wellbeing Approach." They also had a former prosecutor and current Juvenile Court Magistrate who educated parents on internet safety. District guidance counselors reported on social-emotional learning at school and the director of pupil services presented on ways to avoid the "summer slide." A Kirtland parent and yoga instructor, ran two interactive programs—"Family Movement and Music" and "Family Yoga." Both allowed families to exercise and spend quality time together.

For Valentine's Day 2020, the PTA focused on being heart healthy. They provided fruits and vegetables for all elementary students. Students could try healthy foods that they might not otherwise have access to or want to sample. In 2021, the PTA focused on hydration. All students received a bottle of water with a "Stay Heart Healthy and Hydrated" sticker, a heart shaped fun straw, and a hand-out with a water tracker and strategies to encourage water consumption.

"When COVID hit, we immediately shared resources to help our families get through that difficult time via our website and social media," said

Wuliger. "This included mental health resources such as mindfulness apps, resources to manage anxiety and depression, COVID resources, digital safety resources, self-help suggestions, fun virtual activities to do from home, and making sure families knew how to receive a free lunch."

Other COVID safe activities included a virtual spirit week, pumpkin carving contest, holiday coloring contest, and virtual canvas painting events. Last spring, the PTA also purchased stencils and painted "activity zones" on the elementary school playground to encourage our kids to stay active and help practice gross motor skills.

To celebrate their achievements, National PTA presented Kirtland Local Schools and Kirtland Local Schools PTA with a certificate and a National PTA School of Excellence banner to hang in their school.
