KIRTLAND MIDDLE SCHOOL LAUNCHES TUTORING AND HOMEWORK HELP THROUGH ACADEMIC ACADEMY

Seeking to provide academic assistance to any middle schoolers who need it, Kirtland Middle School recently debuted the Kirtland Academic Academy (KAA) program. Meeting every Thursday morning from 7:30-8:30 a.m. in the library, it offers free tutoring, homework guidance, and extra support.

Facilitated by library aide Patricia Saluan, the informal KAA sessions aim to help students in a judgment-free zone. "Whether kids are struggling with concepts, need accountability on missing work, or just want clarification before school, we're here for them," said Saluan. The program originated from Building Leadership Team discussions on supporting student success. Research shows missing assignments can profoundly impact grades and comprehension. By providing a space to help students catch up, KAA empowers kids to get back on track.

And while open and optional for all middle schoolers, the KMS academic team reserves the right to mandate attendance for students chronically missing work. By getting them support, the school seeks to foster better outcomes.

KMS Principal Bob Race said, "With KAA now available, our message to students is clear: we'll provide every resource for you to thrive. Just show up, raise your hand, and let us help you meet your potential."

THIRD GRADERS IMMERSE THEMSELVES IN HUMAN BODY UNIT

The four third grade classes at Kirtland Elementary School recently wrapped up an engaging multidisciplinary unit on the human body systems. The unit covered key topics like the skeletal, muscular, and nervous systems.

To kick things off, students made K-W-L charts to activate prior knowledge and generate curiosity about what they would be learning, answering three key questions–What do you Know about the topic? What do you Want to know? And What did you Learn? A highlight was when they played "Simon Says" to reinforce names of different bones and muscles.

The classes also read about how the eyes and ears take in sensory information which then gets sent to the brain for processing. Using diagrams, students outlined these steps in their journals. They then got to take on the roles of audiologists and optometrists, presenting "lessons" in character to their classmates. Videos of these creative presentations were shared with families on Seesaw.

On top of all the interactive science learning, students also built essential literacy skills—from morphology and spelling to paragraph structure and grammar. Individuals regularly refined these "just-right" skills and strategies through the online platform Amplify Boost.

To celebrate all they learned, the third-grade classes gathered in Hornet Hall to watch the Magic School Bus episode "Inside Ralphie," focused on the immune system. It was a fun culmination following weeks of meaningful interdisciplinary work.



KIRTLAND MIDDLE SCHOOL ROBOTICS TEAMS ADVANCE TO DISTRICT TOURNAMENT

The Kirtland Middle School (KMS) FIRST LEGO Leagues (FLL) robotics teams competed at the Aurora competition on November 18. Both robotics teams were asked to create an innovation project, build and program a robot, and give a presentation on their teamwork.

Congratulations to the Steel Stingers who won the Motivate Award. This award celebrates a team that embraces the culture of FIRST LEGO League through team building, team spirit and displayed enthusiasm.

The Hungry Hungry Hornets team won the Champion's Award. This award celebrates a team that embodies the FIRST LEGO League Challenge experience, by fully embracing the school's core values while achieving excellence and innovation in robot performance, robot design and the innovation project. This is the highest award at the competition and the first time a KMS team has earned this award.

Each team was selected to advance to the district tournament in January.

FALL SPORTS SHORTS

Kirtland's fall sports season ended with the Hornets winning a seventh state football championship, but that wasn't the only highlight of the season.



The Hornets won four Chagrin Valley Conference championships and landed dozens of athletes on the allconference teams.

Clinching league titles were the girls' cross country team, football

team, and boys' soccer team, and the volleyball team won a share of the CVC Valley Division crown.

The girls' cross country team was dominant in winning its fourth straight conference title as the Hornets secured the top three individual places, five of the top 10, and had all nine runners finish among the top 23.



Junior Ainsley Borthwick was named the league's Most Valuable Runner after winning the Valley Division race in 19:46. Borthwick went on to place 53rd at the state cross country meet in 19:52.44. Sophomore Izzie Copeland and junior Syliva Vosicky

finished second and third in 20:56 and 21:09, respectively. Junior Grace Mastrangelo and sophomore Megan Urbanick also finished among the top 10. Mastrangelo placed eighth in 22:30 and Urbanick was 10th in 22:48. Seniors Jessy Jackson and Stephanie Drazetic finished 13th and 16th in 23:10 and 23:40, respectively. Sophomore Kaitlyn D'Amato placed 20th in 24:19 and senior Claire Dumstorff finished 23rd in 25:03.

On the boys' side, freshman Joey Ciavarelli capped off an impressive debut season with first team allconference honors. Ben Brandal and Daniel Booth earned honorable mentions.

Kirtland's football team was nearly perfect in its run to a seventh state championship in Division VI. The Hornets opened the season with a win at Dalton, who went on to finish as the state runner-up in Division VII. A win over Lutheran West followed, but then Perry handed the Hornets a rare regular season loss in Week 3. After that, Kirtland reeled off 13 straight wins, including seven shutouts and a convincing 32-15 win over Versailles in the state championship game.

Senior running back/linebacker Rocco Alfieri was named the Ohio Division VI Defensive Player of the Year and a small-town All-American. Will Beers, Gino Blasini, Matthew Kahley, Will Bates, MacGuire Boyd, and Will Sayle joined Alfieri as first-team All-Ohioans. Jake LaVerde, Brady Burich, and Aaron Fortuna were named second-team All-Ohio.

Kirtland's boys' soccer team finished the season 16-4 overall and 5-0 in winning the CVC Valley Division title.

The Hornets then put together impressive postseason wins that included sectional and district titles before falling 3-1 to eventual state champion Andrews-Osborne Academy in a regional semifinal.



Senior Nick Barisic was named the league's MVP and Vince Carriero, Anand Sundararajan, and Daniel Bak joined him on the All-CVC first-team. Drew Duncan, Luca Oroz, and Jack Green were named All-CVC second team, and Will Bradshaw and Aiden Whited were named honorable mention.

Kirtland's girls' soccer team finished 6-7-4 overall and 1-2-2 in league play.

Stephanie Drazetic, Lily Whitaker, and Brynn Bradac each earned first-team all-conference honors and Clare Davidson was named honorable mention.

Kirtland's volleyball team, led by head coach Ricky Sanders, claimed a fourth straight sectional championship



and fourth straight league title, sharing the Valley Division crown with Berkshire.

The Hornets finished the season 16-9 overall and 9-1 in league play. Senior Nina Loncar was named Co-MVP of the Valley Division and Katie Reynolds joined her on the first team. Alexis Schaffer was a second-team all-conference selection and

Nina Alfieri and Keely Young were honorable mention selections.

Kirtland freshman Nick Nead earned first-team All-CVC honors in boys' golf while teammate Knox Crisci was a second team selection. Ryan Green and Danny Shafer earned honorable mention honors.
